# **SERP-P: A Decade and Counting**



The SERP-P website has undergone several transformations to improve user interface

In year 2000, the Philippine Institute for Development Studies (PIDS) initiated the SocioEconomic Research Portal for the Philippines (SERP-P) project. It was part of the Institute's newest strategy at that time called "Providing the infrastructure for research and networking" which was formally launched in 2002 during PIDS' 25th founding anniversary celebration.

PIDS introduced SERP-P to the public together with four other online initiatives: the Electronic Resource Base for Legislation, which is also linked to the SERP-P; GIS-based Socieconomic Profile of the Philippines; Social Science and Policy Research Network for Agriculture; and the PIDS Library Online Public Access

The SERP-P project is actually a take-off from a previous PIDS undertaking known as the Clearinghouse Project, a database of policy studies from various academic and research institutions that appeared in the Institute's newsletter, <a href="Development Research News">Development Research News</a>. But compared to the Clearinghouse Project, SERP-P is more comprehensive in terms of coverage and content. It also makes use of the latest information technology as well as the benefits of research networking as operational strategies.

The main objective of PIDS with SERP-P is not only to provide the public with easy and timely access to socioeconomic information. It also aims to promote knowledge sharing and collaboration in policy research.

Through the years, the knowledge portal has significantly grown, thanks to the continued participation and support of its member- institutions. The growth of the SERP-P Network is a testament to the increasing commitment of public and private agencies and institutions involved in policy research to knowledge dissemination as an essential tool for education and empowerment.

Back in December 2002, the SERP-P Network had only 19 participating institutions. The portal contained a total of 2,153 publications from 1,326 authors. Today, a decade later since the turn of the millennium when the SERP-P project began, these figures have undeniably risen. Fifty-one institutions are now part of the SERP-P Network, and they have contributed a total of more than 5,000 studies.

To those institutions that have been with us since 2000 and to all the members of the SERP-P Network, our sincere thanks for your support. PIDS would not have successfully sustained and continued this project without your participation. We look forward to more fruitful years of dynamic partnership in development with all of you. **PIDS SERP-P Team**
